To: All Clergy and Licensed Lay Workers

Date: January 22, 2018

Re: Police Records Check (PRC)

It is mandatory for all clergy and lay workers who hold a license or bishop's permission to have a current PRC. The diocese has a contract with XpressChek to complete checks on our behalf. Our diocesan policy requires PRCs to be renewed every three years. For those whose PRCs have already expired or who are within a few months of expiry, you will be notified by email. The diocese funds the cost of checks for all clergy and lay workers who hold a license or bishop's permission and the diocese will be billed directly for the service.

There are two ways in which a check may be completed:

Option 1 - In Person

At the Synod Office see Mary Anne Grant or Jane Wyse. You will be required to complete the Criminal Record Verification - Informed Consent Form and provide two pieces of identification (listed below). This process should take no more than 10 minutes.

Option 2 – Online

Submit a request to Jane Wyse to complete your PRC online. You will then be sent an email with a link to XpressChek along with a username and password. Once logged in, complete the online applicant details form, download/complete and upload the Criminal Record Verification - Informed Consent Form and upload two pieces of identification (listed below). All documents uploaded must be PDFs.

Only checks for licensed clergy and lay workers may be completed through XpressChek. Parish volunteers are asked to obtain their police check through their local police station.

PRCs are an important part of our commitment to ensuring a safe and healthy faith community. Compliance is mandatory and as a result parishes also benefit from lower insurance premiums. Please do not hesitate to refer to the diocesan website for further information or connect with

Acceptable Pieces of Identification

⁽¹⁾ Provincial or Territorial Health Card as Primary ID or Secondary ID: <u>as permitted to be used for identification</u> <u>purposes under provincial law</u>. Government-issued Health card that includes the Applicant's name, date of birth, signature and photo will be accepted if the Applicant <u>volunteers</u> to submit his/her Health Card as a piece of identity <u>and</u> the photocopy of the Health Card number is <u>blacked out</u> before submitting for a criminal background check.
